I've been thinking...

Abraham Lincoln gave two speeches that served to bless the people of the United States of America during a hard time in our history. The listeners were suffering because of a brutal national conflict with loss of thousands of young soldiers and civilians, all victims of civil war. Both of these speeches are preserved for Americans and people of the world on the marble walls at the Lincoln Memorial, which faces the National Mall in Washington, DC. These speeches have words of vital importance for us today.

The first is Lincoln's Gettysburg Address given November 19, 1863 at a grave site of the conflict that polarized the country and led to the war. In his brief remarks, only three minutes long, the president dedicated the grave site on a battlefield of that war as a final resting place, a cemetery, of those who "gave their lives . . . the last full measure of devotion."

Then Abraham Lincoln called for a second dedication with the words, "It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work . . . to the great task remaining . . . that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom – and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Two years later, March 4, 1865, from the steps of the capital of the United States, President Lincoln gave his Second Inaugural address. He chose two words that became the most memorable: *malice* and *charity*. The first word, *malice*, gathers together the pain of injustice and despair of the "lash of the whip" by which he describes the cruelty and terror of slavery in America, an institution of oppression that dehumanized and diminished. In contrast, he adds the second word, *charity*. This is a word of hope for a just and lasting peace that through love is able to bind up the nation's wounds, both morally and physically and bring its people together and prevail over the evil of malice. President Abraham Lincoln dared to boldly choose charity over malice as the mandate for his country and ours. He stated clearly: "With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right."

President Lincoln thought it through. He makes use of texts from the Bible that tell of God's judgement against malice and because of the hope in God's love he prays for the nation: "Fondly do we hope – fervently do we pray – that this mighty scourge of war may speedily pass away." The power of charity is the basis from which every other imperative and promise gains its meaning. While to love God is the first and greatest commandment, the second derives from it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets." (Matthew 22:34-40). Charity lays claim on the power of love to heal a people.

With his words, Abraham Lincoln challenged America to insist its citizens and those elected to lead our democracy are committed to the vision that we, the people, remain "dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal," (Gettysburg) and that we as a nation shall "achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace, among ourselves and with all nations." (Second Inaugural Address).

Two speeches by an American president given over one hundred years ago during a time of crisis continue to call us as a people and as a nation to remember that good and healing vision and to be doers of that good and healing vision, too.
