Preaching at The National Presbyterian Church continues to stretch my mind and heart as I am forced to learn from the Biblical texts and then share the Gospel in this era in which the Christian faith must compete in the public square.

Then, speaking each month for *The Kindlings Muse* at the Burke Museum Café on the University of Washington campus has stretched my mind and challenged me to think about and explore Christian themes in light of writers such as G.K. Chesterton, Alexandr Solhenitsyn, and even Mark Twain. The scope of theological challenge has continued for me as well. A few months ago, I participated in a working conference in New York where pastors, theologians, and scientists endeavored to explain and celebrate how science, with its rigorous curiosity, is a friend rather than a foe of our faith in Jesus Christ.

Over the past several months, I have had a brand new opportunity for stretching with the active engagement and dialogue across lines of faith. Back in Washington, D.C., I meet with the young interfaith (Jewish, Christian, and Muslim) scholars of the Buxton Initiative. These informal meetings have helped me to better understand and respect the historical religious journey of each belief system. I have been encouraged by our discussions.

As I think about my ministry in these years of my life, I remember what I learned when Daniel and I participated in a two-day leadership event with the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust in Vancouver, Washington. There I was reminded of the importance of models in Christian leadership and especially how senior leaders are needed to mentor younger colleagues and share between generations. I pray that I can meet this challenge as I continue to be stretched. Stretching, yes! But comforting, too, because of the good people I keep meeting who are becoming my friends in this new season. With 54 years of ministry behind me, I continue to be stretched. And for this I am grateful.

#### Questions ... and coffee with Earl

The three fellows at the Buxton Initiative have been meeting with Earl monthly since we started our fellowship this past September. It is a rare opportunity to sit in his living room, drink his perfectly brewed coffee, and ask him virtually any question related to faith. His openness and enthusiasm for teaching has led to many interesting conversations, and he has shown us his nuanced, insightful, and loving interpretation of scripture.

As fellows for the Buxton Initiative in Washington, D.C., we work to foster understanding among people of different faiths and worldviews through candid dialogue and authentic relationships. Three recent college graduates of different faiths work together, educate one another on their faith traditions, plan lectures about important contemporary issues regarding our faiths, and work on community outreach efforts.

Our meetings with Earl have enhanced the conversations we have every day about the differences between the Abrahamic faiths. The topics have ranged from the idea of ritual

in relation to Christianity and Judaism, his interpretation of the Sermon on the Mount, and his theological and pragmatic perspective of homosexuality. These topics are challenging – two hours is never enough – especially with the added complication of several faith perspectives.

In September, we were honored at the larger public meeting of the Buxton Initiative for Earl Palmer to share his thoughts on the Holy Trinity, which is a fundamental aspect of Christianity that can be difficult for Christians and non-Christians to grasp. His words were complemented by Suhail Khan, who discussed the Muslim perspective of the Trinity.

#### Daniel on the Road ... and at Home with Earl



The Old Testament text was Job 14:7-9 ("Even a fallen tree will put forth shoots at the scent of water"), which inspired Earl's most recent poem at left that he also shared. The sermon explored how Jesus Christ draws men and women to Himself from wherever we are in our life journeys.

Our Lord did not want his disciples to speculate about the timing of the boundary either of their own lives or of history itself. When we think it over, we realize that this exhortation is wise and realistic advice in our favor. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know what day your Lord is coming ... Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour. Matthew 24:42,44. The discipleship teaching throughout the New Testament is clear; we are to live in obedience to the Gospel as present tense Christians wide awake and carrying on the ministry that God has given us to do, leaving the time boundaries in His hands. We should not worry about shortness of time issues nor about the time it takes to invest the gifts of God's love and faithfulness in the lives of people here and now. There is time, and time is on our side because we work and live within the hours, days, weeks and years that belong to the Lord of time ... St. Augustine put time in its right place: "O God who art ever at work and ever at rest may we be ever at work and ever at rest." Because of Christ we are not a people of timetables or charts or predictions but a people of relationships with God and with each other. We leave the future in God's hands. We might as well because the future is in His hands whether we leave it there or not.
